

Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish

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3rd Sunday of Advent. Year A. 11th December 2022

The Gospels make explicit God's Word to us, through the teachings of Jesus Christ.

We are disciples of Jesus!

Gospel: Matthew 11: 2-11

John in his prison had heard what Christ was doing and he sent his disciples to ask him, 'Are you the one who is to come, or have we got to wait for someone else?' Jesus answered, 'Go back and tell John what you hear and see; the blind see again, and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised to life and the Good News is proclaimed to the poor; and happy is the man who does not lose faith in me.'

As the messengers were leaving, Jesus began to talk to the people about John: 'What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed swaying in the breeze? No? Then what did you go out to see? A man wearing fine clothes? Oh no, those who wear fine clothes are to be found in palaces. Then what did you go out for? To see a prophet? Yes, I tell you, and much more than a prophet: he is the one of whom scripture says: 'Look, I am going to send my messenger before you; he will prepare your way before you. 'I tell you solemnly, of all the children born of women, a greater than John the Baptist has never been seen; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he is.'

Summary

In today's Gospel, John sends word to Jesus from prison, asking if Jesus is the Messiah for whom he has been waiting. Jesus responds by pointing to the miracles that he has worked and invites John and others, to make their own determination. In addition, Jesus praises John for his role in preparing the way for Him. Finally, Jesus speaks to all us *(children born of women)*, when He says that all of those who enter the Kingdom of God, will be as great as St John the Baptist - and even greater: "of all the children born of women, a greater than John the Baptist has never been seen; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he is."

In Conclusion

This week's Gospel continues our Advent reflection on John the Baptist and his message of preparation for the coming of the Messiah, and repentance. Last week we heard John speak about his relationship to the coming Messiah, Jesus. This week, we hear Jesus' message to John the Baptist, now in prison, that the signs that the Messiah has come, are found (evidenced) in His (Jesus') ministry. Jesus also explains John's role in God's plan: he is *much more than a prophet: he is the one of whom scripture says: 'Look, I am going to send my messenger before you; he will prepare your way before you.'*

Note: John's preaching of the coming of the Lord is a key theme of the Advent season. As John's message prepared the way for Jesus in the first century, we, too, are called to prepare ourselves for Jesus' coming, by repentance through the Sacrament of Penance/Reconciliation.



Advent Reconciliation at Nearby Parishes

We respond to John the Baptist's message, by repenting for our sins. We can follow the example of St Dismas (the "good" thief who was crucified with Jesus). Dismas was contrite and repentant (he admitted his sins and accepted his suffering). Dismas had hope and faith in the Lord's mercy - "remember me when you come into your kingdom." Jesus is merciful and forgiving, and assured Dismas of his salvation – "today you will be with me in paradise."

At Reconciliation, we acknowledge our sins before God. We express our sorrow/contrition, receive the forgiveness of Christ and make reparation for what we have done (penance) – this is what Dismas did on his cross and Jesus was merciful and forgiving. We too can be like Dismas, and receive God's mercy and forgiveness, through the Sacrament of Reconciliation!

We Welcome "God's Little Children" to Our Mass



People were bringing little children to Jesus to have him touch them, but the disciples rebuked them. When Jesus saw this, he was indignant. He said to them, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these." Mk 10: 13-14.

Monday 12th December is the Feast of Our Lady of Gaudalupe
The appearance of Our Lady of Gaudalupe in Mexico, in the 16th century, precipitated the greatest flood of conversions in the whole history of Christianity. The Aztecs at the time were performing thousands of children sacrifices, however, Mary's miracle ended this. In the seven years following this miracle, eight million Aztecs converted to Christianity, and Christianity spread across Central and South America.

Our Lady of Guadalupe, like the shroud of Turin, appears on a piece of fabric (a cactus fibre cloak, or "tilma") which still exists today, for all to see, in the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe (situated on the very same hill on which Our Lady appeared) in Mexico. Both are sacred objects, hundreds of years old, and both depict an image said to be mi-

raculous. Our Lady of Guadalupe was declared Queen of Mexico and is Patron of the Americas. Over 20 million people visit the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe each year.

Note. The image cannot be explained. It shows no sign of deterioration after 450 years (the fibric is made from the threads of cactus which disintegrates within 20-60 years!). Microscopic examination reveals no brush strokes, or, protective over-varnish. The image appears to increase in size and to change colours due to an unknown property/substance. The stars on Our Lady's mantle, coincide with the constellation in the sky on 12th December 1531 (the day of her apparition). Scientists who have examined the image confess that it is so inexplicable that it can only be supernatural!
